## Top Stories

### City Council Meeting - February 22

Following a workshop for Ordinance 06-07 that began at 6:00 PM, the regular meeting began promptly at 7:00 PM. The Seldovia City Council convened together to include the following Council Members: Peggy Boscacci, Keith Gain, Tom Glover, Tom Keesecker, Mark Massion, and Walter McInnes. Mayor Wyland presided with City Clerk Ronda Haynes taking minutes. City Manager Kurt Reynertson was also in attendance.

### Ordinance Introduction

**Ordinance 06-08, Amending Title 7.04 of the Seldovia Municipal Code, Animal Control.** Ordinance 06-08 redefines the existing code for animal control. Fines will be increased, and punishment for non-conforming pet owners and caretakers will be more severe. The main issue is the "running at large" of a great number of dogs and will be more sternly addressed by this amended code. The fine schedule will be: First offense~\$10, Second~ \$25, Third~ \$50. The Fourth and later offenses carry a mandatory court appearance and a fine not to exceed \$300. The only change to the current fine schedule is the increase of the Third offense from \$35 to \$50.

**Action:** Unanimously introduced.



**Committee and Advisory Board Reports**

**SOS** - the potluck was a success with excellent attendance and many new members that signed up.

**Borough Planning and Zoning** - Nothing to report

The **Chamber of Commerce** will be hosting a steak dinner and local theater presentation this Saturday evening at a cost of \$35 per plate. The money raised by this dinner will support the upcoming Woodworkers Chainsaw Carving Contest that will take place in the end of May. It was brought to the attention of the Council that the hard cost on the food alone was a significant part of the per plate cost. Chamber President, Mary Glover, suggested that even one member of a family could attend if the price for a couple was too much of a hardship. The Woodworkers Chainsaw Carving Contest will be a great “kick-off” for the summer season and the dinner is a crucial part of the fund raising for this event. Tickets can be purchased at The Herring Bay Mercantile.

**EMS** - Nothing to report.

**Vista Volunteer**, Lisa O’Leary, is continuing her efforts on obtaining a grant for the Lake Susan Boardwalk Project. She is simultaneously researching this grant and using it for her on line grant writing class. Recently there was some federal monies released to the Denali Commission that are specifically designed for waterfront roadways. The federal funding would be available for the next three years. Time is short to apply and O’Leary will be working towards the goal of getting the application in a timely way.

**Fish and Game** - Nothing to report

**17B Trails Committee** The City of Seldovia received a letter from The Bureau of Land Management. It has been suggested that a mediator be used to reach a mutually agreeable solution.

**Old Business**

**Ordinance 06-07, Amending the Sundry Fee Schedule to Add a Large Vessel Surcharge.** City Manager Reynertson stated that the City wants to discourage larger vessels from using the Seldovia Harbor since they place undue strain on the docks. When larger vessels are allowed, a surcharge will be imposed on all vessels over 100 feet in length.

Two amendments were made to the Ordinance prior to it's passing:

1. All vessels over 100 ft in length must pay the monthly rate.
2. An additional surcharge of \$10.00 per foot, per month, will be assessed on that portion of a vessel over 100 ft moored at Seldovia Boat Harbor

Councilman McInnes thinks that we are limiting our potential customers and wished that we had the additional funds [the additional funding would be substantial - over \$500,000] required to strengthen the pilings and dock in the Seldovia Boat Harbor.

*Action:* Passed unanimously.

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**BLM 17B Trails Correspondence**, Councilman McInnes presented a letter from The Bureau of Land Management that stated, in part, that there is a reserve system of trails for public access to Seldovia Lake and state lands at the head of the valley. This reservation allows for motorized use. The Seldovia Native Association has opposed this use and filed an appeal to the Interior Board of Land Appeals, which was subsequently denied. BLM has agreed to assist in this with the use of a mediator to, "pursue mediation in an effort to resolve this controversy successfully." Councilman McInnes wishes for The City of Seldovia to respond to this letter, thanking them and agreeing on the mediation suggested as a course of action. Councilman McInnes thinks that the success of this mediation will be greater if the 17B Trails Committee is 100% supported by the City of Seldovia and full Council support. Councilman Gain interjected that he has a rough draft completed already that will be put on city letterhead with the full support of the mayor and the council members. Councilman McInnes feels this initial contact is crucial for the success of this mediation.

*Action:* Voted to move forward on this correspondence unanimously.

## New Business

**Resolution 06-16, Supporting a Settlement from the EXXON Valdez spill for Restoration of Natural Resources**, is a resolution that reopens the 1991 civil settlement from the Exxon Valdez Spill and claim the full \$100 million for restoration of natural resources suffering unanticipated injury. Councilman Gain asked to be excused from voting due to a conflict of interest (excuse approved).

*Action:* Passed unanimously.

## Final Comments and items not on the agenda

Councilman McInnes stressed the importance of attending community meetings to show council support for community events. Councilman Massion and McInnes thanked City Manager Reynertson for his work on the X-Ray machine. Reynertson mentioned that HEA was going to give us a "break" on the cost of electrical install for the machine. Reynertson mentioned that he was surprised about the high cost of the building wiring but the grant money will be enough to cover the cost. Work will begin when the ground is workable. Councilman Glover mentioned that a tsunami public presentation will be available to the public on February 23 at 7:30pm. USGS representative, Brett Higman will be the speaker for this public presentation.

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## **Electric Rates increased in 2006** *HEA News Release*

### *Higher fuel costs = higher electric bills*

In response to increasing costs for natural gas and the need for system maintenance, HEA is increasing rates in 2006.

As of January 1, the wholesale power cost rate adjustment (WPCRA) increased from 0.28 cents per kilowatt hour to 1.94 cents. The increase is due mostly to the rising cost of natural gas which is the fuel source for the majority of power purchased by HEA. WPCRA, calculated on a quarterly basis, forecasts the purchased power cost and energy sales to members for this coming quarter. This pass-through charge represents costs that are mostly paid to Chugach Electric, HEA's wholesale power supplier.

In addition, HEA has filed a request with the Regulatory Commission of Alaska seeking an eight percent increase in the base rate, from 11.16 cents per kilowatt hour to 12.05 cents. If approved, the base rate increase will go into effect on February 1, 2006. The increase, which would be just the second in the last ten years, is needed to cover increasing operating costs (fuel, insurance, interest, materials, etc.) that all businesses are facing.

The proposed base rate increase, combined with the change to the WPCRA, would result in an overall blended rate of 13.99 cents per kilowatt hour, an

increase of 2.5 cents from December 2005.

For the average residential member using 650 kilowatt hours, the average monthly electric bill will increase by about \$16.58. Despite the proposed increase for 2006, HEA rates have remained relatively stable over the last several years.

In October 1995, the blended rate for Homer Electric members was 10 cents per kilowatt hour. If the proposed rate hike is approved, HEA's blended rate will have increased 40 percent in the last ten years.

General Manager Brad Janorschke says the utility works to keep rates as low as possible and still maintain and improve the electric service provided to HEA members.

"While it's never easy to request a rate increase, this action is necessary to ensure we can continue to move forward and take care of the needs of our cooperative. As a cooperative, we will continue to explore ways to expand our power generation options, lessen our dependence on natural gas, and stabilize the cost of electricity to our members," said Janorschke.

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## Creationism Seminar comes to Seldovia

### *Hank Giesecke illuminates the swiss cheese in the evolutionary theory...*



Mr. Giesecke visited Seldovia for a three-day seminar debunking the theory of evolution while educating the public on the soundness of the Creationism Theory.

Giesecke is a regular in Soldotna at the Bible camp named Solid Rock. Solid Rock is geared toward youth and their progress in scriptural teaching and fellowship with each other. A safe place to "hang" and hear God's Word.

Hank Giesecke, is a highly educated individual, with a M.S. Aerospace Engineering from the University of Southern California. To his credit he was in the NASA Command Center at the moment when Apollo 8 went around in moon in 1968. He is also Head of Development for the Fan Ansel Creation Research Center ([website](#)) and is on the faculty at [Yavapai College](#). (He is an interesting man to perform a search in Goggle and see how many hits you get!)

Giesecke is also tremendously involved in missionary work in Africa. Giesecke suspects that the small country in Africa, Burundi, is possibly the

only country that has a Christian president. He feels that it may end up being a “shining light” in a nation plagued by poverty and civil unrest and war. Giesecke will travel back to Burundi, where he will teach at Hope University in the areas of science and creationism. He would like to be a facilitator for the local government in establishing an independent financial economy, one which the local people can be employed, harvesting and cultivating local product ( such as soybeans) for export elsewhere. This would help greatly in the movement towards the country's solvency. Giesecke will use his extensive background in engineering and finance to promote this growth.

A huge part of the African diet is based on corn. The African people would like to diversify their diet, swinging the pendulum back to a protein-based diet. This would require more money. Giesecke hopes that bringing industry into Burundi would bring round a good cycle for all. More money means a higher quality of life and better options for the indigenous peoples of Burundi, Africa. Giesecke reflected that Africa takes ones' heart in one fell swoop. The people are so grateful for the care and assistance that it moves mountains. Giesecke has worked hard to raise money for a new clinic that was stymied due to funds. Just \$1,000 was all that was needed to finish off this crucial facility for the peoples medical needs. Giesecke hopes that Burundi may be an example of what happens when positive change takes place and a domino effect may ensue.

Giesecke is concerned that the evolutionary viewpoint is damaging to the young psyche. If we are teaching our children that they are nothing but “pond scum,” then why are we surprised when they rise to the occasion? Teaching creationism makes scientific sense. It enriches the young mind which grasps that we are more than “existing” here but have a higher purpose. Life feels more valuable when viewed with that perspective, individually and as a whole.

Giesecke feels most fulfilled when he is education and helping others. Seldovia is a stepping stone in his path of working to serve The Lord in whatever capacity that he would see fit. He hopes that Africa will be just as fruitful and looks forward to his mission work in that field of endeavor.

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## **Sen. Gary Stevens Report - February 20**

Hello from the Capitol. With the Legislative session well into its second month, the pace of work has increased substantially as the Senate and House work toward the May 9th scheduled adjournment.

One of the crucial issues we will be looking at in coming days is the Governor's Petroleum Profit Sharing Production Tax. A bill setting out the governor's proposal will be sent to the Legislature Tuesday, February 21. This new tax structure will replace the present ELF (Economic Limit Factor), which served the state well when oil prices were low, but is not helping us in this era of high prices. Enacting this new tax structure will bring Alaska's coffers billions more in revenue in ensuing years and is an important component in ongoing negotiations between the administration and the oil companies on a natural gas pipeline.

I anticipate both the Senate and House will be devoting a great deal of time to this bill in the next few weeks. I expect that we will pass legislation that will

be balanced, encourage further exploration and development, and ensure that larger companies do not fracture in order to benefit from tax credits.

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## Rep. Paul Seaton Newsletter - February 20

Greetings from Juneau on this President's Day and the 42 nd day of the legislative session. There is much talk about the oil tax restructuring but we have not yet seen the details of the Governor's bill. I met with our legislative oil tax consultant over last weekend to delve into the complexity of the proposed system and look forward to insuring that Alaska creates a fair and equitable deal now that will still be effective in the future. The House majority sponsored another open caucus on Thursday to receive a presentation and to discuss the Alaska Natural Gas Port Authority's "Y" line proposal. This incorporates a 1 Billion Cubic Foot (BCF) per day Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG) facility in Valdez with a 3 BCF pipeline option down the Alaska Canada Highway and a 0.200 BCF spur to Southcentral. The LNG portion would utilize 6 to 8 US constructed vessels to service the West Coast. Many legal hurdles have been overcome. Time Certain Waivers to the federal Jones Act have been utilized while US ships are being built, and it appears to be a logical proposal that has been a roadblock in the past. Since all the gas would go to domestic markets, an \$18 billion federal loan guarantee would apply. Quick timing is imperative for any project as that federal guarantee sunsets in October of 2007. This project does not need any of the tax, royalty, or investment concessions that the all-highway route negotiations with the big producers entail. The biggest unknown is whether the "producers" will be willing to sell or ship their gas. The 'tax-it-in-the-ground if not shipped' initiative or similar legislation would be a big influence on that decision by the big three producers.

A number of fishermen on both sides of the Chignik Co-op issue have been here trying to get – and to block – legislation to override the Supreme Court decision which disallowed the Cooperative with an allocated percentage of the Chignik salmon catch. Since it is past the date for filing personal legislation, such a bill would have to be a Standing Committee bill with obvious referrals to Fisheries and Resources. Resources will be tied up with massive work on the oil tax restructure for some time.

We have had excellent visits with University of Alaska students and the Regents about their budget requests. The school districts have been meeting with all legislators. I anticipate both these budgets will be contentious because there is strong support in the House for addressing the K-12 geographic cost differential with opposition primarily from two members of the Senate who are the strongest advocates for the University.

I enjoyed meeting with the following District constituents this last week. Marianna Keil and Charlene Ditton were in town from the Seward and Homer Legislative Information Offices. Cathy Bears, Lynn Hohl and Diana Hill were visiting from Seward, as were Bob Ward and Jamie Ross from Homer. Diana was able to serve as a guest page on the House floor while she was here. Damon Absher, Cassandra Davis, and Tabatha Johnson from Homer were here advocating for University funding. It is always a pleasure to visit with our

school board members. **Sunni Hiltz representing Seldovia** and Sammy Crawford from Kenai stopped by to say hi and remind us all of the importance of K-12 education.

**City Manager's Corner**

City Manager Report for the period February 13-17, 2006

- Lot 4 of Block 6, Waterfront Resub 2 has an established minimum bid price of \$60,000. I have the new land sale bid package completed which will be available to any perspective bidder. The appraisal document or report for this lot (and the other lots that were appraised) is available in the city office.
- Mr. Milton was granted a building permit for his dock at the special meeting of P&Z on February 17, 2006 . The next step will be to work with Mr. Milton to give him an ingress and egress from his property. I had been previously authorized by Council to work with, develop, and execute an agreement with Mr. Milton on this issue. This is in process.
- I have asked Jim Hopkins to look at the grid in order to determine what temporary repairs would be necessary for the upcoming season.
- Michael Foster and Associates will be here the week of February 27th to discuss the small boat harbor design as well conduct the kick-off meeting for the Village Safe Water project. They would like to meet with the Council and the Public in a workshop environment on Tuesday, February 28 at 2 PM .
- As you know, the X-Ray machine is here and sitting in the clinic. The next obvious step is to get it hooked up. HEA did approve the assistance to new subscribers and as such the HEA cost on the electrical hook-up of 3 phase power will be significantly less. I have a verbal agreement from Jim Hopkins for a utility easement down his property line that will allow HEA to run the 3 phase power a much shorter distance to a meter base on the back-side of the Community Building . HEA will be preparing the necessary paperwork for the utility easement. Jim's concerns revolve around the patching of Lipke Lane after the 3 phase power line trench is cut and the filled in. I have assured him that we will patch it "right" to insure proper drainage is maintained.
- A course entitled "Building a Marketing Plan" is being offered via the Seldovia Village Tribe on February 27 and 28 from 1 PM till 5 PM . I plan on attending the course. There are any number of items that we, as a City, can market to include:
  - Our harbor
  - Various properties for sale or lease
  - Our airport (while this does not belong to the City we can still market it)
  - Our City to granting agencies
- I have available a draft outline for the formation of a Port Authority from our consultants. Each member of the Council will receive a copy of the outline. The consultants would like to come to Seldovia and go over any questions concerning the draft and Port Authorities in general in the very near future. The outline is also available for public consumption if they would like to pick up a copy at the City office. It is a fairly comprehensive outline and does a good job of addressing topics of concern. This outline will guide the City, via the consultant's work, on establishing an enabling ordinance that will be brought to the Seldovia public for a vote.
- Mike Beal of the SNA would like to come and fully brief the Council on the current status of the Kachemak Bay Ferry feasibility study and preliminary engineering design. He has indicated that the briefing will be a full-blown power point presentation and would like to schedule it for the March 22 Council meeting.

**Seldovia Police Report** by *A.W. Anderson, Chief of Police***> Repeat Story <**

A gas can and hose were found stored under the front of a vehicle which was parked in the parking lot at the Seldovia Airport. It was evident by the footprints that a number of vehicles had been inspected by who ever left the can and hose. Anyone having information is encouraged to call the Police Department.

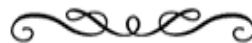
A report of water running out from under the porch of a vacant residence was received by the Police. The owners of the residence were contacted and the information was passed along. They found they had a broken water line inside the home and a significant amount of damage had occurred as a result.

A report was taken of five gallons of gas stolen from the back of a pickup truck. The gas can was returned to the vehicle with the gas and the gas caps missing.

A welfare check was conducted after a call was taken from a person who was concerned after having not been able to contact their party after repeated attempts. The subject was contacted and all was found to be in order. The caller was notified that all was well.

Eleven people came by the Police Department requesting documents be notarized, two vehicles were stopped for equipment violations and one person requested assistance from the Police.

Five people have been contacted about allowing their dogs to run at large in the City and two people have been contacted regarding their dogs barking excessively, which constitutes "Public Nuisance" under our Municipal Code. All of these people have agreed to deal with the problem and I have definitely observed a difference in the last couple days. These contacts were made following the receipt of some complaints and some observations by the Police. Given the number of dogs in Seldovia it is apparent that most people do care for their animals and keep them up but for those who fail to do so Ordinances have been enacted. At present the fines for this offense are \$10 for the 1 st offense, \$25 for the 2 nd offense and \$35 for the 3 rd offense, all within a 2 year period. The 4th and subsequent offenses are mandatory court offenses and the violator gets to explain to the Judge why the law does not apply to them. I personally do not think the \$10, \$25 and the \$35 fines are strong enough deterrents and I am going to ask the Council to make the fines \$50, \$100 and \$150 respectively. I'm hopeful this will have the impact needed to encourage those who do not keep their animals up, to do so. If you, as a citizen of our fair City, have any ideas in this regard I would love to hear from you. I am also working on an Ordinance that addresses "Vicious Dogs" and I hope to have something that better deals with this problem to give the Council in the near future.



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
