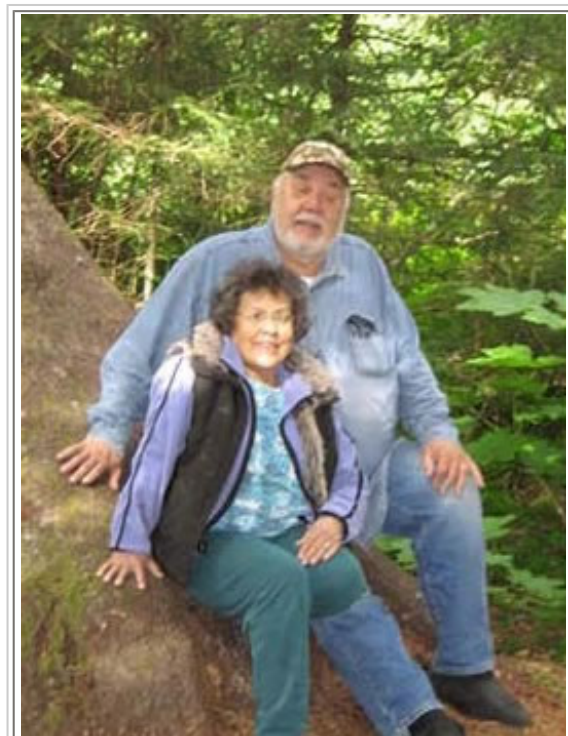
City of Seldovia Recognizes Andy's 30 years of Service!

Dad,

I can't believe it's been 30 years of service for the City of Seldovia as Chief of Police. I was 10 years old when you started and I remember being so proud of my daddy becoming a Police Officer. I know you always thought it was so hard being the "Cops daughter" as I was growing up, but really it wasn't. I never got teased or bugged about being the "cops kid" (I guess because everyone was too afraid of you to pick on me J).

I know that having such a great upbringing from you and mom helped me stay very self assured and determined, but of course I've always been a daddy's girl and I miss our "talks" we would have as I was growing up...it was just me and daddy time. Still to this day I can go almost anywhere and talk about Alaska, and the small town I'm from and someone will always know where Seldovia is at. I let them know that my dad is the Chief of Police and they always say "oh you're Andy's daughter", and they always have great things to say about you, I am proud to be "Andy's daughter".
